



RE: Complaint at 88 River Street (Map 2, Lot 5463), Middleborough, MA (A+ Waste & Recycling Services, LLC)

On March 3, 2015 the Conservation Department received a complaint concerning 88 River Street (Map 2, Lot 5463). The following are some of the details of the complaint:

- 1) The septic system has failed because the electric has failed and the pump is no longer working therefore sewage is being dumped at the rear of the building. There is a bathroom for the office that exists inside the building.
- 2) Dumping has been occurring of hydraulic fluid, motor oil and diesel into an underground tank that is under one of the old kilns in the building.
- 3) There is also an open pit in the building where there has been dumping of fluids.
- 4) Fuel has been dumped in the storm drains on site.
- 5) A pipe that goes into the Taunton River from the site has been witnessed with rusty water flowing out of it.
- 6) The building is uninsured.

On another note the owner of the property Ronald High contacted the office yesterday morning and asked if he could store snow from the Christmas Tree Shops Warehouse parking lot off Route 18/28 on

his property at 88 River Street. I told him that the Commission would need to review this. I sent him via e-mail the Snow Disposal Guidance that DEP has posted on their website. Here is the link to this information (<http://www.mass.gov/eea/agencies/massdep/water/regulations/snow-disposal-guidance.html>)

The Conservation Commission has been very concerned about this site so much so that it has been on our agenda as unfinished business for months. On April 23, 2014 the Commission issued an Order of Conditions under DEP File # SE220-1198 for stormwater improvements at the site for existing runoff. We have been told by Mr. High that this work under this permit will start once the snow is gone. This permit is currently valid till April 23, 2017. With all of the compost that exists on the site and with the snow melt anticipated we are concerned with the runoff into the wetland resource areas.

The complaint detailing sewage and hazardous waste being improperly disposed of onsite with the potential to reach the wetland resource areas as well as the federally protected Wild & Scenic Taunton River is a major concern. There are also residential properties in the vicinity of this operation that have private wells so there is a concern about human health risks.

I would suggest that a site visit be conducted with all of the departments listed here to determine the extent of the activities complained about.

**FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE****Save The Bay expands seal tours and nature cruises into Fall River**

**PROVIDENCE, RI - March 4, 2015** - Save The Bay is pleased to announce the expansion of its winter seal tours and nature cruises into Fall River, Mass. for the first time. Departing from the Borden Light Marina at 1 Ferry Street in Fall River, the 90-minute tours will be held on Saturday, March 21 and Sunday, March 22 at 1 p.m. and on Saturday, March 28 and Sunday, March 29 at 10 a.m. Each trip can accommodate 30 people, and if registration fills each day, Save The Bay may open up a second trip immediately afterward.

Aboard one of Save The Bay's education vessels, guests will cruise the lower Taunton River and Mt. Hope Bay on the look out for seals and such early spring wildlife as migrating Longtail, Goldeneye and Scoter ducks, among others. Save The Bay's expert guides will help visitors spot the winter seals resting on rocks and winter birds, and discuss the history and environmental issues of the region. Binoculars are available on board the boat.

Seals in Taunton River? "Seals use the entire Bay, and wherever the fish go, seals are likely to follow," said Save The Bay Captain Eric Pfirrmann. "But truly, these are our first-ever tours on the Taunton River, so they'll be voyages of discovery for all of us."

The new seal tour location is in keeping with Save The Bay's 2020 Strategic Plan, which calls for expansion of the organization's environmental education outreach into the Taunton River Watershed, Fall River and Mt. Hope Bay areas. "These areas are critical to the health of Narragansett Bay," said Pfirrmann. In fact, 60 percent of the Narragansett Bay watershed lies in Massachusetts. The Taunton River is the second-largest source of freshwater flowing into the Bay, a critical spawning habitat for many Bay and ocean fish, and the only major river in the Narragansett Bay Watershed that has never been dammed. "And Fall River is the second-largest community on the Bay and its third-largest port, so it makes sense to offer our programs there," he said.

"Save The Bay's mission is to protect and improve Narragansett Bay. We may be located in Rhode Island, but our mission certainly extends well beyond our state borders. Our work depends as much on the people of western Massachusetts as it does the people of Rhode Island," Pfirrmann said.





Dear Ms. Tracy:

On Thursday, February 12, 2015 at 5:25PM I met with you and your colleague Jake concerning the above-mentioned sites that are currently before the Zoning Board of Appeals for proposed Ground Mounted Solar PV installations and associated equipment.

The following items were discussed:

- 1) You agreed that the wetlands needed to be delineated in the field at all four locations. MassGIS data will not be accepted.
- 2) Based on the wetland delineations a Notice of Intent under the Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act may need to be submitted to the Middleborough Conservation Commission for any proposed work in the 100-foot buffer zone.
- 3) You acknowledged that there is a 25-foot no disturb zone at all of the wetland boundaries once those boundaries are approved by the Middleborough Conservation Commission and that no work shall take place in that zone, not even the trimming of trees.
- 4) The 25-foot no disturb zone is part of the Middleborough Water Resource Protection District By-law under the charge of the Board of Selectmen acting as the Water Commissioners. Any work proposed in the 25-foot no disturb zone would require filing an application with the Board of Selectmen, however there are only a few exemptions for work in the 25-foot no disturb zone.
- 5) You stated that at Gid Circle off Purchase Street and 115 Purchase Street you would like to keep shrubs but take trees down in the 100-foot buffer zone. You also stated that you would use the



existing poles on Gid Circle and that these two sites would be independent of each other and not connect through the wetland.

- 6) You also stated that no herbicides would be used and that no detergents would be used to clean the panels. There would be just clearing around and in-between the panels and that clover will be planted and maintained.
- 7) Purchase Street (Map 67, Lots 3281 & 5686) is mapped by the Division of Fisheries & Wildlife Natural Heritage & Endangered Species Program under the Massachusetts Endangered Species Act (MESA) and will require that you contact this state agency about filing an application under MESA.
