
Thank you very much for volunteering your valuable time to serve on this most important committee and best of luck as a member thereof.



WPA Emergency Certification Form
Massachusetts Wetlands Protection Act M.G.L. c. 131, §40

C. General Conditions

1. Failure to comply with all conditions stated herein, and with all related statutes and other regulatory measures, shall be deemed cause to revoke or modify this Emergency Certification or subject to enforcement action.
2. This Emergency Certification does not grant any property rights or any exclusive privileges; it does not authorize any injury to private property or invasion of property rights.
3. This Emergency Certification does not relieve the applicant or any other person of the necessity of complying with all other applicable federal, state, or local statutes, ordinances, bylaws, or regulations.
4. Any work conducted beyond that described above, and any work conducted beyond that necessary to abate the emergency, shall require the filing of a Notice of Intent.
5. The Agent or members of the Conservation Commission and the Department of Environmental Protection shall have the right to enter and inspect the area subject to this Emergency Certification at reasonable hours to evaluate compliance with this Certification, and may require the submittal of any data deemed necessary by the Conservation Commission or the Department for that evaluation.
6. This Emergency Certification shall apply to any contractor or any other person performing work authorized under this Certification.
7. No work may be authorized beyond 30 days from the date of this certification without written approval of the Department.

D. Special Conditions

DPW to submit documentation and pictures of what is installed to repair the culvert.

E. Appeals

The Department may, on its own motion or at the request of any person, review: an emergency certification issued by a conservation commission and any work permitted thereunder; a denial by a conservation commission of a request for emergency certification; or the failure by a conservation commission to act within 24 hours of a request for emergency certification. Such review shall not operate to stay the work permitted by the emergency certification unless the Department specifically so orders. The Department's review shall be conducted within seven days of: issuance by a conservation commission of the emergency certification; denial by a conservation commission of the emergency certification; or failure by a conservation commission to act within 24 hours of a request for emergency certification. If certification was improperly granted, or the work allowed thereunder is excessive or not required to protect the health and safety of citizens of the Commonwealth, the Department may revoke the emergency certification, condition the work permitted thereunder, or take such other action as it deems appropriate.

Dear Director Jarvis,

It was a pleasure to briefly meet you on March 13, 2015 at The Boston Harbor Islands pavilion on the Rose Kennedy Greenway, Boston. We appreciate National Park Service's (NPS)'s ongoing support for the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) and many other programs.

As you may know, the mission of The Nature Conservancy is to conserve the lands and waters on which all life depends. We do this through the dedicated efforts of our diverse staff, including more than 600 scientists, located in all 50 U.S. states and more than 35 countries. We are successful with the help of our many partners, from individuals and governments to local nonprofits and corporations. We are proud to stand with NPS and work together on many of our shared priorities.

As I mentioned to you briefly at this event, the Taunton River was designated a Wild and Scenic River in 2009. While most rivers receive on average, \$150,000, NPS has never requested more than \$30,000 for the Taunton River. Our towns have been told by NPS that additional funding could not be obtained until Congress appropriated a higher level of funding for the Wild and Scenic Program. However, in the FY16 budget, NPS proposes fully funding a new river designated in 2014 (Upper Missisquoi and Trout Rivers in Vermont). While we appreciate additional funds to the program, we request your help to ensure that the Taunton River also receives full funding.

The original intent by then Senator Edward M. Kennedy was to have a base funding level of \$200,000 for the Taunton River. The Nature Conservancy continues to be an active partner in the Partnership for Wild and Scenic Rivers and is lobbying Congress to appropriate full funding for the program. This federal infusion of funds allows our towns to leverage additional monies. For example, \$7,000 was used to help leverage an \$800,000 dam removal project (Whittenton). Our communities are proud of what they have been able to accomplish, but full funding would allow for a designated river coordinator to raise and leverage additional private and non-federal funds.

We hope you will reconsider the Taunton River in FY16 and to include full funding for the Taunton River in the FY17 budget. Thank you for your consideration.

My name is Adam Bond, and I am writing to you in your capacity as the appointing authority for the Middleborough Police Department.



Re: Status of Hazard Mitigation Grant Program Applications from Applicants without an Approved Local Hazard Mitigation Plan

Dear Director Schwartz:

The purpose of this letter is to update you on the status of seven project applications under the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program ("HMGP") submitted by the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency ("Grantee"). The applicants for the seven projects are the Towns of Chelmsford, Middleborough, Tewksbury and Westford and the applications are divided across four different major disaster declarations. **Attachment 1** to this memorandum contains a matrix that details the local government applicant, HMGP project application title, proposed federal share, and major disaster for each application. The total potential federal funding for all of the applications at issue is \$4,457,160.

Federal regulations require local government applicants for HMGP project subgrants to have an approved local mitigation plan in accordance with 44 C.F.R. pt. 201 before receipt of HMGP subgrant funding for projects.¹ The local mitigation plan is the foundation for effective hazard mitigation and not only represents a jurisdiction's commitment to reduce risks from natural hazards, but also serves as the guide for decision makers as they commit resources to reducing the effects of natural hazards.² The Regional Administrator may grant an exception to the local mitigation plan requirement in extraordinary circumstances when justification is provided.³ If the Regional Administrator approves this exception, a local mitigation plan must be approved by FEMA within 12 months of the award of the HMGP project for that community.

Here, none of the four towns have an approved local mitigation plan and the Grantee has not submitted any requests for the Regional Administrator to grant an exception to the local mitigation plan requirement. Our records indicate that Chelmsford, Middleborough, Tewksbury and Westford submitted draft hazard mitigation plans to FEMA Region I for review, but FEMA

Region I returned those plans to those communities for revisions because they did not meet the minimum requirements of 44 C.F.R. pt. 201. These four towns, unfortunately, have not resubmitted their plans for FEMA review.

FEMA Region I has provided more than sufficient time for the four communities to submit satisfactory local mitigation plans. All of the major disasters at issue under the applications have occurred at least two years ago, with one of the declarations (FEMA-1895-DR) occurring almost five years ago. Such delays in the funding of HMGP projects impact the successful management of the Disaster Relief Fund as well as the implementation and closeout of the HMGP and the major disasters.

The Disaster Recovery Manager ("DRM"), therefore, has set a **deadline of May 26, 2015**, for the Grantee to submit to FEMA a local mitigation plan meeting the minimum requirements in 44 C.F.R. pt. 201 for each of the seven communities. If we do not receive a sufficient local mitigation plan for a community by May 26, 2015, the DRM will move forward with a final ineligibility determination for that community's HMGP application(s).

I commend you for the efforts that have been put forth in implementing the floodplain management measures for the Town of Middleborough, Massachusetts, to participate in the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). As you implement these measures, I want to emphasize the following:

- a Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) have been completed for your community;
- the FIS and FIRM will become effective on July 16, 2015; and
- by the FIS and FIRM effective date, the Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Regional Office is required to approve the legally enforceable floodplain management measures your community adopts in accordance with Title 44 Code of Federal Regulations Section 60.3(d).

As noted in FEMA's letter dated January 16, 2015, no significant changes have been made to the flood hazard data on the Preliminary and/or revised Preliminary copies of the FIRM for Plymouth County. Therefore, the Town of Middleborough should use the Preliminary and/or revised Preliminary copies of the FIRM as the basis for adopting the required floodplain management measures. Final printed copies of the FIRM for the Town of Middleborough will be sent to you within the next few months.

If you encounter difficulties in enacting the measures, I recommend you contact the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation. However, in the event your community has not adopted the appropriate measures, this letter is FEMA's official notification that you only have until July 16, 2015, to adopt and/or submit a floodplain management ordinance that meets or exceeds the minimum NFIP requirements, and request approval from the FEMA Regional Office by the effective date. Your community's adopted measures will be reviewed upon receipt and the FEMA Regional Office will notify you when the measures are approved.

I appreciate your cooperation to ensure that your community's floodplain management measures are approved by the FEMA Regional Office by July 16, 2015. Your compliance with these mandatory program requirements will enable your community to avoid suspension from the NFIP.

On behalf of the Baker Administration, I am pleased to announce the 2015 Sustainable Materials Recovery Program (SMRP) Municipal Grant Application. The SMRP was authorized under the Green Communities Act and MassDEP regulations (310 CMR 19.300) to provide grants to Massachusetts municipalities and regional government entities for recycling, composting, reuse and waste reduction activities in support of the State's Solid Waste Master Plan goals. SMRP is funded by the Waste Energy Credits Expendable Trust, created under the Green Communities Act.

We have two important updates to this year's program. First, municipalities are invited to apply for a new **Carpet and Mattress Recycling Incentive Grant** that will reduce the financial burden of managing these materials as solid waste, while increasing reuse and recycling. Second, we have allocated more resources to the **Recycling Dividends Program (RDP)** which will provide nearly \$1 million in payments to qualifying municipalities this year. Last year, MassDEP awarded \$3.3 million to 179 communities and regional entities through SMRP.





REGULATION

1.000 Variances

1.001 Authority: This regulation is promulgated pursuant to the authority granted to the Middleborough Board of Health by Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 111, Section 31.

A) Review and Issuance Authority:

The Middleborough Board of Health or Middleborough Health Officer may vary the application of any provision of a regulation adopted by the Board of Health pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 111, Section 31. A variance may be granted only when in the opinion of the Board of Health or Health Officer –

(1) The person requesting a variance established that enforcement of the health regulation provision from which a variance is sought would be manifestly unjust; and

(2) The person requesting a variance established that a reasonable level of protection of public health and/or public safety can be achieved without enforcement of the provision from which a variance is sought.

B) Variance Request:

Every request for a variance shall be in writing, shall state the specific provision of a regulation from which a variance is sought and include in the request facts, reason(s) and argument why enforcement of the provision would be manifestly unjust and facts, reason(s) and argument why and how a reasonable level of protection of public health and/or public safety can be achieved without enforcement of the provision.

C) Appeal:

Any person aggrieved by the decision of the Health Officer on a request for variance shall be entitled to a hearing before the Board of Health and such person shall file with the Board of Health within seven days after notice of decision, a written request for hearing.

To the Health Department, Board of Selectman

Since the early 80's there have been ongoing issues at the Kampgrounds of America (hereafter K.O.A.). They range from zoning to health to planning board and assessors. There could even be others. The K.O.A. is in rural residence zoning and operates under a special permit which is obtained from the zoning board. Any alterations at the campground need a special permit. Up until the 1980's the K.O.A. was obtaining these permits. The registry of deeds records every variance or special permit given by a town to the property as an encumbrance sort of like a lien to ensure the owner of the property obeys the law and abides by these laws. Any changes to these special permits needs to be addressed by a board of the town a hearing needs to be published and people can go and voice their concerns. I know that as employees of a town and members of boards that I do not have to tell you what the procedure or laws are I am sure that you all know.

The encumbrances for special permits stop in the 1980's the certificate number for the K.O.A. encumbrances is 111207. Everything that has been done since the 1980's was done without a special permit up until 2012 when the zoning board gave the K.O.A. a special permit to have additional sites which they already had since the 1980's (see attached inspection sheet from the building inspector stating the number of sites they had in 2001). That corrected one broken law that was ongoing but it did not correct others like the number of cabins that they have placed on the property since their special permit for two. They now have over 20. Each cabin as they were placed should have received a special permit to do so. Each site that was put in should have had a special permit before it was put in. Each trailer that is left on site during the winter is unlawfully there. Each trailer that is not registered is unlawfully there. Each trailer that has a structure that is attached is not allowed.

The planning board allowed the 101 acres that the K.O.A. originally started with to be subdivided and parts of it sold. The assessor's office still allows all the pieces of the property to get chapter 61b rate even though two pieces are separated by another owner. The campground operated with improper sewage from the 1990's when the law changed until the Department of Environmental Protection stepped in and made the K.O.A. bring the failed system up to code. I know I don't need to bring any of this to anyone's attention it is all known and was always known but the most recent letter that I picked up from the health department has made me wonder why so many people failed in Middleboro and why a few survived.

The attached letter shows a variance being given to the K.O.A. by the health officer. I have searched for the hearing that took place that allowed this to be done and could not find one. In March of 2014 there was a hearing and the K.O.A. withdrew their request the next week. Looking forward in the agenda's I saw no requests submitted again. The Middleboro review had an article about people and how a man was stepping forward and telling his story and I believe others should do the same. The problem is that once you step up you are put down and as a person that did this for thirty years I know firsthand what the consequences are. I would like to know the legality of the variance the health officer gave the K.O.A. It is my belief that a variance is issued by a board.
